Australia National War Memorial



Dear Veterans, about two years ago Neville (an 80 year old Navy Korean Veteran) and I made a promise that we would visit the Australian National War Memorial and after so many other prior commitments we finally did it. It was 20+ years ago since I last visited the War Memorial and I must say I cannot remember much and neither could Neville who had not seen the Memorial since over 40 years ago.

Yet after arriving and spending at least one and a half days at the Memorial it was absolutely amazing (picture above: Neville and five-inch gun mount from HMAS Brisbane). Obviously being NZ Veterans we turned a blind eye to the information portraying Australian veterans (not too much of course as they are our ANZAC comrades) but at each display of each conflict we pictured our own Veterans at those same conflicts fighting in those same conditions. And as we went from one conflict to the next, from one period to the next, from each display to the next, Neville's heart kept getting sadder and sadder and to put it into perspective you need to understand that Neville has seen a lot of his intake pass away, there are very few left (you can count them on one hand) so whilst it was wonderful to visit such a stunning display and gathering of military history, actually being in those same conflicts can have an impact that only we as military veterans know and feel. I am sure the impact would have been much worse had we visited all three Museums in NZ.

Nevertheless, it was a weekend well remembered (picture right: Neville remembering his Korean conflict). I am not going to promote the War Memorial or expand on the conflicts because we already know what they are and have our own memories to bare. As veterans we go to places like this for our own reasons and for Neville, I can only think that he went for the same reasons I did, Lest We Forget.


ANZAC Day 2010

NZ Army Officer first Kiwi to receive NATO Medal

Lieutenant Colonel Jeremy Ramsden, MNZM at a special ceremony in Brussels, Belgium.

LTCOL Ramsden, from Petone, was presented with his medal by NATO Secretary-General His Excellency Mr Jaap de Hoop Scheffer, at a North Atlantic Council meeting.

The medal was awarded to LTCOL Ramsden for outstanding service while he was working for the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) in Kabul, Afghanistan. He was deployed for six months as the Deputy Chief of Plans on the ISAF HQs, spending some eight weeks as the Acting Chief of Plans.

His medal citation commends his superior leadership and example, stating that "he was extremely proactive, pursuing excellence to ensure the quality and tempo of his branch's work. He focused on maintaining momentum and the Commander's intent as multiple command and staff changes occurred, in an often tumultuous environment."

While in Afghanistan he implemented a combined planning framework with the Afghan National Security Forces. Without hesitation, he developed this into a partnering arrangement which he championed at the HQ ISAF staff level, requiring remarkable resilience and diplomacy to implement.

LTCOL Ramsden said he was honoured to receive the medal, "but it belongs to my wife and kids, they made the sacrifice, this was my fourth operational tour."

The NATO MSM was first awarded in 2003 to commend military and civilian personnel for providing exceptional and





remarkable service to NATO, be it through acts of courage in difficult or dangerous circumstances, exceptional leadership or outstanding individual contributions.

Currently 853 New Zealand Defence Force personnel are deployed on 14 operations, UN missions and defence exercises in 10 countries around the globe.

New chapter as Army Marae renews life force

Renovated Whakairo carvings were formally re-commissioned at a 'Whakarite' ceremony at the National Army Marae - Rongomaraeroa o Nga Hau e Wha Marae - in Waiouru this week.

A ceremony on 22 June blessed and formally acknowledged those involved with the project which saw carvings at the entranceway (Tomokanga) and wharenui refurbished, and in one instance, completely re-carved.

Chief of Army Major General Rhys Jones said it was great to bring the Marae back to its ideal state:

"It is a place where we bring new people into the Army to understand what is like to be part of Ngāti Tūmātauenga," Major General Jones said at the ceremony.

"The carvings are symbols of what we feel in the Army. Courage, strength, and we take that with us when we leave. We are strong because we are one in the Army."

In September 2008, it was identified that over the last 14 years the original carvings had suffered extensive water and environmental damage rendering them unsafe and rundown.

This began the genesis of a project named "Mauri Oho" (an awakening or regeneration of life force). The project was led by Mr Jim Te Tuhi and Te Rangi Kaihoro and two teams assisted with the carvings in what was a whole-of-family affair. Fourteen people were based in Auckland and nine in Te Kopuru – a small town on the Kauri Coast near Dargaville.

While the group intended to carve with Kauri, after they began work on a seven metre piece of the wood, they realised it was Rimu due to its density and weight. One carved panel called the Paepae-roa required a six-man lift to fix it into place on the porch of the wharenui.

The Tomokanga entranceway at the National Army Marae which greets visitors first is unusual in that both sides are carved. The front set of carvings of the Tomokanga was so damaged it needed to be completely re-carved. This side is painted black to symbolise the role a solider performs in wartime to protect ones nation. During the upgrade the carvers used a more contemporary style which 'jumps off' the backboard but keeps in the same theme of the original carving.

The other, red side of the Tomokanga (which faces the wharenui) required refurbishment and repainting and included special emphasis on the apex figurine of a cross.

Named Te Ngira (the needle), the Red Tomokanga welcomes those to the ranks of the Army and depicts the journey on becoming a soldier. It represents all soldiers within Ngāti Tūmātauenga joining together as one strand and passing through the eye of the needle.

The original carvings of the Tomokanga were commissioned by A Company of the 28th Māori Battalion who supported Te Tuhi and Kaihoro to do the carvings. Eventually these works were a different size and shape to the steel frame of the entranceway and were adapted to fit, so after 14 years, the carvings were able to be specifically re-designed and personalised for the framework.

Two of the carvers involved in the National Army Marae project, Whetu Hautapu and Lucky Te Tuhi, were also recognised at the Whakarite ceremony as graduating to Tohunga – master carvers.

As part of the Marae's ten-year plan, a maintenance schedule has been included to take care of the carvings, including the skills required for touch-ups and the correct protocol around their care.

HISTORY OF CARVINGS AT RONGOMARAEROA O NGA HAU E WHA MARAE, NEW ZEALAND ARMY NATIONAL MARAE COMPLEX.

1. Ngāti (tribal) status was written about by General Birk's 91/2 Memorandum delivered to The National 28th Māori Battalion Conference February (2nd month) in 1991, and conferred to the New Zealand Army by Māori in Easter 1994. Ngāti Tūmātauenga was officially recognized as a tribal entity within New Zealand at the opening of the New Zealand Army National Marae in October 1995.





- 2. The Taonga (treasures) which adorn the Marae were gifted by various Iwi (tribes) and people and acknowledge their acceptance of the Ngāti Tūmātauenga concept. Mr Jim Te Tuhi was a key figure in overseeing the carving projects for the opening of the Marae and has been instrumental in the current project to renovate the carvings.
- 3. The tomokanga (entranceway) to the Marae and welcomes you to the ranks of the Army and depicts your journey, on becoming a Soldier. The hōia (soldier) who stands defiantly at the apex represents your standing and mana which is achieved by discipline, hard work, courage and determination to strive for and attain leadership qualities.
- 4. The Red Tomokanga is named Te Ngira (the needle) and represents all soldiers within Ngāti Tūmātauenga joining together as one strand and passing through the eye of the needle. The maihi (bargeboards) reflect the contributions of those personnel responsible for this Marae. They also represent the individual and collective responsibilities to achieve a common goal to preserve the history of past Units that have served New Zealand.
- 5. Traditionally Māori name a whare after an ancestor and thereafter all the stories within that whare tie back to that ancestor. Soldiers of the New Zealand Army do not trace their lineage to one ancestor, therefore, the name "Te Whare Tū Taua ā Tūmātauenga" (The House of War pertaining to the God of War Tūmātauenga) was found to be more appropriate to encapsulate the diversity and full representation of the New Zealand Army.
- 6. The carvings on the maihi of the whare explain the elements of training and the will to succeed, with the right side showing the progress of the soldier, and the left side the progress of the officer. The Ama (upright posts) represents various Atua Māori

(Māori gods) with the tekoteko (carved figure) on the top of the whare representing Tūmātauenga.

7. The pae roa and pae iti (carved panels across the mahau (porch)) represent some of the histories of the mana whenua of Waiouru and of Tūwharetoa, Ngāti Rangi and others.

Fresh from a successful humanitarian aid mission on Pukapuka in the Cook Islands, Navy Amphibious Support Ship HMNZS CANTERBURY has departed today from the Devonport Naval Base bound for Apia, Western Samoa.

The deployment to Western Samoa is primarily to transport No. 3 Squadron RNZAF to conduct a tropical flying exercise - TROPIC ASTRA 09. Embarked onboard CANTERBURY are four RNZAF Iroquois Helicopters, 70 personnel, 15 containers and support vehicles/equipment from No. 3 Squadron RNZAF.

To bring the total to five aircraft onboard, HMNZS CANTERBURY will also embark its own Seasprite Helicopter and utilise it to re-supply the Department of Conservation station on Raoul Island en route to Apia.

This deployment represents the first time the New Zealand Defence Force has been able to fully deploy all necessary aircraft, equipment and personnel using its own resources. In the past these types of exercises have been supported by RNZAF C-130 Hercules Aircraft which has limited the amount of support equipment that can be practically deployed.

The ability to move support vehicles such as trucks, fuel tankers and four wheel drive vehicles, as well as the four aircraft; directly to the Area of Operations will enable No. 3 Squadron RNZAF to fully meet all of its exercise objectives.

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Exercise TROPIC ASTRA 09 will be conducted from 29 July to 1 September 2009 and is an annual RNZAF exercise designed to provide readiness training in tropical flying operations, including civil tasking and aircrew survival training for selected aircrew personnel.

In addition, the RNZAF will be conducting flying tasks in support of the Samoan Government as directed through the NZ High Commission. All of the activities being conducted will simulate what will happen in real time on air operations whether it is disaster relief, humanitarian aid or search and rescue and aid to local Governments.

CANTERBURY has also embarked a number of New Zealand Army vehicles and once No. 3 Squadron RNZAF has been safely transported to Apia, CANTERBURY will then move on to DARWIN to uplift Australian Defence Force vehicles and equipment which she will then transport on to Dili in Timor Leste. On completion of this final tasking, HMNZS CANTERBURY will attend the Indonesian Fleet Review in Bitung Waters on 21 August.

Heading back to Apia on 31 August, HMNZS CANTERBURY will uplift the four aircraft, equipment and personnel of No. 3 Squadron RNZAF and start the homeward journey back home to New Zealand.

HMNZS CANTERBURY is due back home at the Devonport Naval Base on Tuesday 8 September 2009.

For New Zealand, the three distinct Services – Navy, Army, and Air Force – combine their capabilities into the one New Zealand Defence Force for maximum joint effect.

Information on Tropic Astra 09

TROPIC ASTRA 09 provides an excellent opportunity for No 3. Squadron (helicopters) and Expeditionary Support Squadron personnel to operate in a tropical environment enabling personnel to build skills and experience.

TROPIC ASTRA 09 is an example of the varied and challenging activities performed by the RNZAF in support of New Zealand's strategic interests in the pacific.

TROPIC ASTRA 09 highlights the RNZAF commitment to joint operations and this is one of the many exercise deployments that enhance the NZDF's interoperability working with a number of local and government agencies in Samoa.

Background

The Navy Band was formed in the early 1960's from a nucleus of formal Royal Marines musicians who remained in New Zealand after the Royal Marines Band was recalled to the United Kingdom.

Today, the Navy Band's primary role is to satisfy the ceremonial requirements of the Navy, which includes support at Royal, Vice Regal and State occasions. When not on the parade ground or supporting official ceremonies, the Band supports local charities

and community based organisations with concerts and other high profile performances.

Over time the Band has diversified to meet the changing needs of the public and a number of new groups have formed within the band including a Big Band, Rock Band, Jazz Combo, and Brass Group. In 2003 the town of Taupo formally adopted the Navy Band.

Royal New Zealand Air Force Comes To Solomon Islands

The Royal New Zealand Air Force (RNZAF) visited Honiara 13-15 July as part of New Zealand's ongoing commitment to Solomon Islands border management and protecting its waters against illegal fishing.

New Zealand is responsible for patrolling more than six million square miles of ocean, including much of the South Pacific, against Illegal Unreported and Unregulated (IUU) fishing.

Illegal fishing is estimated to cost Pacific Island countries up to US\$350 million per year.

"New Zealand works closely with regional partners, including Solomon Islands, to target illegal fishing. This work is done through the Forum Fisheries Agency (FFA) and by RNZAF P-3K Orion patrols," said New Zealand High Commissioner Deborah Panckhurst.

During the visit, Royal Solomon Islands Police Force Superintendent Silas Karani (Acting Officer in charge of RSIPF National CID Division) joined the RNZAF patrol to fly around the edge of Solomon Islands Economic Exclusion Zone. "RSIPF relies on good-quality evidence collection to build successful cases. Watching the RNZAF crew at work reinforced how inter-agency co-operation can contribute to this process," said Supt Karani.

Two FFA surveillance operations officers, Martin Campbell and Allan Rahari, also took part in the patrol.

"The flight gave us a great opportunity to work with one of our key surveillance partners. We were able to see how information provided by FFA fits into RNZAF operations to result in an effective patrol," said Campbell.

"We also discussed with the RNZAF crew how we could work more efficiently to improve the service that we offer together to the region," added Rahari.

Another significant task for the RNZAF in the Pacific is search and rescue operations, and disaster response assessment and assistance.

In February 2009 an RNZAF Orion patrol was asked to fly over West Guadalcanal to take photos of extensive damage caused by heavy rain and flooding. The photos were then provided to the Solomon Islands Ministry of Infrastructure to help the Ministry to target its recovery and rehabilitation efforts.

"It's satisfying to know that New Zealand's collaboration with Solomon Islands and regional partners can make a difference", said Deborah Panckhurst.

Air Force Iroquois helicopters join search for missing aircraft

An Air Force Iroquois helicopter has been called to assist the Rescue Coordination Centre NZ with a search for an overdue civilian aircraft approximately 50 nautical miles NNE of New Plymouth. A beacon is transmitting from the aircraft, believed to be in rough terrain. The Iroquois, which is both night vision and winch capable, launched at approximately midnight and arrived in the search area at 2am this morning.

Due to poor weather and low cloud on the ridge tops, the Iroquois was unable to get to the exact location, "the winds made flying very challenging" said Flight Lieutenant Paul Aitken, the Iroquois Captain.

A second Iroquois launched from Ohakea has now replaced the first helicopter and departed at first light to assist insert ground search teams into the area. An Air Force fuel tanker has also been dispatched to provide a refuel option closer to the search area.





14 x UH-1H Iroquois helicopters are flown by No 3 Squadron RNZAF based at Ohakea. An aircraft has a standard crew of three (pilot, co-pilot, helicopter crewman). In this case a trainee helicopter crewman was also part of the crew.

The Squadron provides:

Operational support and training for the NZ Army, specifically in tactical air transport, special operations and aeromedical evacuation.

Helicopter conversion (Sioux) and operational conversion (Iroquois) training for pilots and helicopter crewmen.

Search and rescue, medical evacuation, NZ Police support, and assistance to other Government agencies
