I am pleased to report that it has been decided to reschedule the programme to 8.30 pm immediately following the ANZAC Lecture. That avoids a potential conflict with the 6.00 pm News on the 'other channels'.

It lasts 30 minutes and while its main focus is on the events leading up to the award of the MC and the reunion last month with Hari Prasad it does extend to John's time in Vietnam and the aftermath. I confirm my earlier advice that later, at a date to be advised, there will screen a full hour documentary on John's life which expand on the coverage in the initial programme.

US Memorial for NZ Veterans

The first New Zealand soldiers killed during the Vietnam War will have their names etched on a United States memorial to be unveiled next month. Bombardier Robert "Jock' White and Sergeant Alastair Don will be listed alongside 29 Australians who also died while attached to the US army's 173rd Airborne Brigade during the early stages of the conflict.



The memorial for the brigade's 1800 casualties sustained in Vietnam will be dedicated at the National Infantry Museum at Fort Benning, Georgia, on June 1.

The New Zealand duo were members of the Royal New Zealand Army's 161 battery and were part of the only Anzus combat unit to serve in Vietnam when their vehicle was destroyed by a controlled land mine on September 14, 1965.

They were the first of 37 New Zealand armed forces personnel to die in Vietnam between 1965 and 1971.

Scottish-born Mr White enlisted from Dunedin and was 28 when he was killed; Mr Don, from Kurow in North Otago, was 27. They are both buried at the Terendak Camp cemetery in Malacca, Malaysia.

The 173rd was the first major American ground force deployed in south Vietnam. The brigade's troops were known as "Sky Soldiers".

The national president of the New Zealand Returned and Services Association, Robin Klitscher, and Veterans' Affairs New Zealand General Manager Rick Ottaway welcomed the New Zealanders' inclusion.

Australian liaison officer for the 173rd Association and former 1RAR machine gunner Ray Payne added no higher honour could be granted to those who died while serving with the elite US unit.

"This will be the only memorial on American soil to list Australians and New Zealanders," Mr Payne said.

However, there is already a New Zealand presence on the Vietnam Veterans' War Memorial in Washington DC.





Corporal James Edward Lott was born in Auckland to an New Zealand mother and American father and enlisted with the US Marine Corps in 1967. He was killed in action at Chu Lai on May 8, 1968, and the 21-year-old is buried at the Waikumete cemetery in Auckland.

RNZAF Notice re RNZAF Veteran Cap

Dear Veterans, Chris Brownie has kindly forwarded the following information from the National Secretary of the RNZAF Association:

The baseball caps came as a result of an enquiry to Air Staff by a former ex-RNZAF member who wished to wear a distinctive







cap at commemorative events such as ANZAC Day. I was contacted by Air Staff, as both National Chairman and National Secretary of the RNZAF Association. We agreed on the cap wording, the cap features the recently adopted Kiwi roundel logo with the words RNZAF VETERAN on two lines below the roundel. The caps are a navy blue color. I was asked if I would assist in the sale and distribution of these caps to members of the RNZAF Association, I also sold some ex members who do not belong to the Association. I sold 400 caps in a little over a month. The caps were sold at cost, plus postage and packing. Postage is a huge cost, a single cap within NZ costs \$5.50. The caps were \$12.50 each. The RNZAF is currently out of stock, manufacturing another tranche of caps will take a little while. There is a cost of wrapping paper, string, tape etc to keep in mind when doing the mail out, and boxes - I scrounged shoe boxes which are ideal for the task, NZ Post's boxes are overpriced. I would be willing to manage the distribution again, but not until around August as I have overseas travel plans looming. If there are a number in Australia wishing to obtain a cap it might be best if one person co-ordinated the orders, and accepted payment which could be forward directly to the RNZAF.

New ship HMNZS WELLINGTON boosts Navy capability

The Navy's capability to patrol New Zealand's coast was boosted today with the formal acceptance of HMNZS WELLINGTON into the Royal New Zealand Navy.

Chief of Navy, Rear-Admiral Tony Parr and Ministry of Defence Project Director Gary Collier formally accepted the Offshore Patrol Vessel, the seventh and last ship in the \$500 million Project Protector, at a ceremony in Melbourne.

"WELLINGTON and her sister ship OTAGO are modern ships designed and built to undertake Exclusive Economic Zone

patrols, surveillance and military operations around New Zealand, the southern ocean and the Pacific," said Admiral Parr.

"WELLINGTON and OTAGO have the capability to operate further offshore than our existing patrol vessels, stay at sea longer, and conduct more challenging operations – using their helicopter capability, sea-boats and embarked forces."

HMNZS WELLINGTON is the seventh and last ship in the Project Protector fleet, and with her delivery the Navy will be operating a fleet of 12 modern and highly capable ships.

"With the completion of Project Protector the Navy can deliver the full range of operations from combat and security missions to peacekeeping, border patrol and humanitarian and disaster relief," said Admiral Parr.

The delivery crew of HMNZS WELLINGTON will now undertake safety and operational preparations for her delivery voyage to New Zealand.

Army medics to receive royal banner

His Royal Highness (HRH) Prince Richard, the Duke of Gloucester, will present the Royal New Zealand Army Medical Corps (RNZAMC) with the Prince Richard Banner at Linton Military Camp on Thursday 20 May.

The Duke of Gloucester has an affiliation with the RNZAMC as its Colonel-in-Chief and the opportunity to visit Linton will also allow HRH to meet soldiers and officers from the RNZAMC.

"I am proud to represent our Corps on this day, a Corps which carries a rich history of exemplary commitment and care for our soldiers. A corps which is innovative, forward thinking and passionate about delivering the best care for our comrades," says parade commander Lieutenant Colonel Dunn (Regimental Colonel RNZAMC).

A Banner is a sign to which the Corps can acknowledge their loyalty and duty to honour the laws of the community in which they are placed, it represents duty towards Sovereign and Country. It is a symbol to which soldiers can honour the courage and commitment of predecessors and a beacon to which soldiers can aspire to achieve high standards of courage, comradeship, commitment and integrity.

The parade will begin at 1030 and is expected to take approximately two hours. It will be followed with a formal photo, meet and greet with medical personnel and viewing a display of current capability and equipment.

Background:

RNZAMC Corps Day

Most Corps observe a Corps Day, usually a day having great significance to the Corps or to its allied predecessor in the British Army.

RNZAMC Corps day is 7 May, the anniversary of the formation of the New Zealand Medical Corps in 1908. Prior to 1983, the day was celebrated on 23 June, the date in 1898 that Queen





Victoria placed her signature on the Royal Warrant which signified her will and pleasure that the Royal Army Medical Corps be formed.

The RNZAMC Colours

The RNZAMC Corps Flag is divided into three equal horizontal panels of Ruby upper, Purple Navy, central and Gold, lower. The history behind why the original colours were selected remains obscure, but the accepted explanation is that: Ruby or Dull Cherry represents blood, Purple Navy or Royal Blue depicts the colour of the facings of the uniform, and Gold indicates the Royal Assent on the formation of the Corps.

Formation of the NZMC

The New Zealand Medical Corps was formed by an amendment to the Defence Regulations dated 7 May 1908 Gazette No. 38/1908.

Royal Warrant

Orion finds Cook Islands' castaways

Four men marooned on Manuae Island in the Cook Islands are spotted by a Royal New Zealand Air Force P-3K Orion (AK10-027-003)

The crew of an Air Force Orion aircraft found four men marooned on Manuae Island (near Aitutaki) in the Cook Islands after they had been reported missing for five days.



The 12*m* longline fishing vessel "Gypsy Trader" left Rarotonga on the 5th May and was due back 9th May. The well equipped vessel had а

communications system, emergency beacon, life jackets and dinghy and an outboard motor. The alarm was raised when a crew member's wife contacted Cook Island authorities when they did not return or make contact.

Cook Islands authorities diverted a scheduled Air Rarotonga flight to the Gypsy Trader's last known position but they found no trace of the vessel. The authorities then contacted the Rescue Coordination Centre in NZ and a P3 Orion aircraft from No 5 Squadron, RNZAF was dispatched during the early hours of Saturday 15 May 2010.

The Orion crew found the four men (two of whom hold NZ passports) on Manuae Island when they spotted a dinghy and a blue tarpaulin set up as shelter on the beach. An emergency pack was dropped to the men which included a radio and confirmed that they were from the Gypsy Trader.

Commanding Officer No. 5 Squadron Wing Commander Nick Olney said, "It was a great result for our Orion crew who are trained to think of all possibilities when a vessel goes missing, including the possibility that the people on board may be at a remote land location, rather than being at sea."

It appears that the four men moored the vessel and then went ashore. The vessel then slipped its mooring approximately 10 days ago and drifted off in a southerly direction. They had been marooned on the uninhabited conservation reserve ever since. A patrol boat from Rarotonga uplifted the four men yesterday.
